While preferable to the current system, the question arises as to who decides whether the person has fulfilled this criterion. If it is to be the Registrar General, then this is still placing judgement of the validity of a trans person's gender in the hands of one or more (most likely cis) strangers. This is unacceptable. Even if it is a matter of self-declaration, it remains the case that gender is a fundamentally internal matter, and does not intrinsically depend on behaviour, dress, etc.

As above, I see no reason to impose any waiting period. The very act of applying for gender recognition is evidence enough that the person is sure of eir own gender and takes the process seriously. A compulsory 'period of reflection' betrays a lack of trust in trans people's ability to know themselves, a lack of trust to which cis people are not subject.

3 Should the minimum age at which a person can apply for legal gender recognition be reduced from 18 to 16?

If you wish, please give reasons for your view .:

Yes. People as young as two or three can be capable of expressing a clear sense of gender—whether congruent or dissonant with the one assigned at birth. People transitioning in their teens are now quite common, and interacting with society when your legal documents show the wrong gender can be inconvenient at best and at worst outright dangerous. Lowering the age at which recognition can be sought to 16 is the absolute minimum; ideally it should be younger still—12 or 14, for example.

The refusal to extend recognition to non-binary people is unacceptable, and serves no purpose that I can see except to appease bigots both within and outwith the SNP/Scottish Government. Non-binary people exist, and at present are forced to exist with official documents that are legally required to be inaccurate. Rectifying this situation should be a matter of the utmost urgency, but instead, members of the Scottish Government have chosen to use NB people as a bargaining chip to placate transphobic elements of their own party. I find this not only unacceptable but deplorable.
